Short Bios:

As a graduate of U Auckland, Tony Brunt is a historian and photo historian specialising in co-Ionial era photography from the South Pacific, especially from the former German colony of Samoa. Tony has been a consultant and volunteer photo archivist to the Museum of Samoa since 2012 and created the museum's long-running online photo exhibition on the German colonial period. He has spearheaded the museum's public outreach through social media in relation to historical photography and has written two illustrated books on early Samoa. Tony is of English, German and Samoan descent, and has family links to the Samoan villages of Lano on Savai'i and Lufilufi and Malaela, on Upolu. In 1993, he was given an ali'i chiefly title in a ceremony at Malaela. He is married to Samoan teacher Feuna'i Brunt.

Nicole Perry is a Senior Lecturer in German and Comparative Literature at the University of Auckland. She was a Lise Meitner-Programme fellow (2013-2017) at the University of Vienna with the project "Performing Germaness; Reclaiming Aboriginality" and a postdoctoral fellow in the Institute for German Studies at the University of Vienna working on the critical edition of the letters (Briefausgabe) of the Austrian-American Charles Sealsfield (1793-1864). She completed her PhD in Germanic Languages and Literatures at the University of Toronto (2012) with a dissertation on the German image of North American Indigenous people from 1800-present.
